# Grantmaking that Makes a Difference

If Oregon's social justice movement were a garden, you could say MRG's role has been to water many seeds—we award a lot of small grants, and watch to see which organizations take root. Seeding the grassroots is important, and we'll keep doing it. And we'll provide greater support to those groups that have taken root.

As we grow, we'll tailor our programs to put more resources where groups are having the greatest impact and meeting unmet needs.

## Last year we:

- » Awarded half a million dollars in activist-advised grants
- » Administered an additional \$285,000 in donor-advised grants
- » Convened three strategy sessions for grantees linking peace activism to the larger social justice movement

## In the year ahead, we will:

- » Expand grantmaking by \$100,000
- » Increase the size of individual grants so groups can do more
- » Revise our grant programs to better support grantees at different stages of growth





## **GRANT PROGRAMS AT MRG**

### **General Fund**

This is the primary emphasis of MRG Foundation's grantmaking. Groups receive funding to build community power and organize for social justice and institutional change. MRG Foundation awards grants for both general operating expenses and special projects.

### **Peace Fund**

This fund is dedicated to strengthening Oregon's peace movement so that it has the tools needed to shift public policy away from war and towards peace and social justice.

### **Travel Fund**

Travel Grants provide opportunities for MRG grantees to participate in conferences or training opportunities that strengthen their organizing work.

### **Critical Response Fund**

Critical Response grants provide groups with an opportunity to organize a progressive response to an unanticipated event, opportunity or crisis.

### **Technical Assistance Fund**

This short-term program that ended this year expanded MRG grantees' organizational capacity and effectiveness.



- » Increase MRG's visibility in the community



Rural 23%


Statewide 20%




