

- Building our grantees' and our own capacity to tell our stories and engage more people in social
 justice work.



Friends of Family Farmers Molalla

Family farmers face challenges as agribusiness crowds them out of natural resources and the marketplace. Founded in 2005, Friends of Family Farmers is uniting Oregon's independent family farmers with food advocates and concerned Oregonians who want a better food system. They are working for agriculture that respects the land, treats animals humanely, sustains local communities, and provides viable livelihoods for family farmers.

Friends of Family Farmers has worked with residents around Canby to ward off a 1.5 million-bird factory chicken farm. In Salem, they are bringing farmers' voices to the table to create long-term changes to keep family farming possible for many generations to come.

MRG Grant: \$6,000



MRG's Grassroots Grantmaking Programs

In 2008-2009, MRG Foundation made almost \$600,000 in grants to community-based groups across Oregon.

Grant recipients rolled up their sleeves and went to work in Irrigon, La Grande, Coos Bay, Portland... In communities across the state, they are creating change. Grantees are:

- Developing leaders among young people of color
- Connecting the cost of war to the current economic crisis
- Working to save some of the last wild areas in the state
- Organizing low-wage workers for better conditions

MRG's grantees are tackling the toughest problems out there, and are led by people directly affected by those problems. In communities of every size, they are taking on the root causes of injustice.

We are often the first funder to recognize their work and the urgency of the issues they are taking on. Our grassroots grantmakers are out in the community organizing and working alongside these grantee groups. They are drawn from the same communities and issue areas that we fund, and volunteer their time because they know how critical it is to support progressive work across our state. Most of our grassroots grantmaking grants are made via the General Fund, but also include the Peace Fund and the Critical Response & Travel Fund.



VOZ Workers' Rights Education Project Portland

Hundreds of day laborers gather on corners in Portland looking for work, and are often subjected to harassment and mistreatment. While the mistreatment of any worker is unfair, it also lowers the safety and dignity of all workers.

VOZ is part of a national movement of groups working to improve the lives of day laborers. VOZ has opened the Martin Luther King Jr. Worker Center to increase worker safety. Day laborers contribute to governing the center and have agreed to a minimum wage.

Over the last nine years, VOZ has won over local businesses and neighborhood associations who have come to understand the struggle of day laborers. VOZ will continue to change the conditions for day laborers and the public dialogue about these workers for years to come.





Human Dignity Coalition Bend

Founded in 1992 as a local response to anti-gay legislation, Human Dignity Coalition has become the hub for progressive activism in Central Oregon. In 2007, they organized much-needed rural support for Oregon's landmark law protecting LGBTQ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans and Queer) communities from discrimination.

Now, Human Dignity Coalition is making sure that this new law translates into real change in people's daily lives. They are working in local schools with youth, teachers, parents, and the local Gay-Straight Alliance to change the environment in schools and end the bullying and harassment of LGBTQ youth.

In addition to our grassroots grantmaking, MRG also administers donor advised grants for people who want support in making donations to other organizations.

Opening a donor advised fund at MRG can help you simplify your giving and provide immediate tax benefits, while offering a flexible timetable for deciding where you want your donations to go. Donor advised giving is especially helpful for people who wish to remain anonymous, who would like to make a larger donation in one tax year and spread the impact out over time, or who make more than \$10.000 in donations.

CHANGE WE CAN COUNT ON

Even in this tough economy, MRG Foundation has maintained a strong financial position and is able to provide unwavering support to Oregon's progressive movement.

In the fiscal year between July 1, 2008 and June 30, 2009 ("FY09") we met 90% of our goal for fundraising, while our assets dropped just 5% as a result of the fluctuations in the stock market. While, like many organizations, we saw a dip in donations and our investments decreased in value, our losses were relatively minor and we were in a strong enough position to deal with these changes.

Equally important, we were able to increase our grants to community-based organizations at a time when many other foundations were cutting back. In FY09 we gave out more grants than ever before. Our "bottom line" shows us spending more than we took in this year, thanks to a historic \$3 million gift we received in 2007. We're using a portion of that gift to jump-start a growth in MRG's capacity.

We know that now — more than ever — progressive groups need financial support to create the change we need. Our increased capacity means we can make more grants right now and also reach more people who will become future supporters.

The charts on this page show how our assets, income, grantmaking and other expenses have changed over time. This way, you can see how our continued growth translates into support for the progressive movement in Oregon.

Leslie Brockelbank 1923-2009

2009 marked a major transition in Oregon's social justice movement as we said farewell to MRG Foundation co-founder Leslie Brockelbank, who died in Eugene in August at the age of 85.

Leslie was a lifelong activist who was beloved by many communities, but here at MRG we have a special gratitude to her. In 1976, Leslie and Charles Gray gave a gift to the community of \$500,000 — seed money for what became MRG Foundation.

The remarkable thing wasn't that they were willing to give this money. It was that Leslie felt strongly that it shouldn't be up to her, as a person with wealth, to decide the best use of the money. Leslie and Charles summoned people who were directly involved in the social justice movement to the banks of the McKenzie River for a weekend gathering to decide how to use the money to support peace and justice.

In the decades that followed, Leslie stayed connected and was a sounding board for the people who led the organization day-to-day without trying to direct their work. She believed she was just one of many people working for justice and that each person brought great value to our collective work for a better world. She lived her beliefs of respect for people and equality.
